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



We invite acclaimed international artists to exhibit as our guests, not in formal galleries but in public buildings adapted for their work. It is a privilege to have them exhibit in Pittenweem.

With our Bursary Award scheme we are able to support new graduate artists by providing a venue and accommodation. Over the last eight years we have awarded bursaries to fourteen graduates from Scottish Schools of Art. Jill Macleod is this year's winner in venue 64 and we are pleased to see that three previous bursary winners are also exhibiting, in venues 55, 56 and 60.

My thanks go to all the artists who have gathered to make this event possible and to the village community whose patience and goodwill we rely upon while their lives are disrupted.

Please note that the east pier is still under repair from two dramatic winters. This will not affect your wanderings but please take note of restriction signs. The engineers have been most helpful in limiting disruption over the festival period.

Disabled parking and toilet facilities are available adjacent to the shuttle bus stance in Charles Street car park. There are also toilet facilities at West Braes, Coastline Community Church in Session Street, the harbour, and the Church Hall in James Street (see map in centre pages).



The bus loops continuously (about 20 minutes between buses) from Charles Street car park, along the High Street down to the harbour and West Shore, returning by the main road to Charles Street car park. The driver will stop/pick up on request and help with buggies and non-motorised wheel chairs. This service is free, but donations on the bus are appreciated.

Positive Patterns

n 1994 Christine Borland purchased a female human skeleton as the starting point for the exhibition From Life at Tramway, Glasgow. Since then her works have explored our sense of self in relation to the medical and scientific institutions of life and death, making visible people and practices which are usually inaccessible to a general public.

In recent works she has also made visible territory that is often hidden or unseen. By introducing ambiguous qualities like the imagination into objective contexts, her works engender a new and aesthetic relationship with the subject matter.

... Borland has questioned how we identify truth, or objective, scientific fact and fused traditional, conventional forms and materials of art - such as the use of bronze or ceramics - with advanced, new technologies. Her work is always mindful of the fact that how we look affects what and how we understand.

Since 2012 Christine has been laser-scanning a series of Barbara Hepworth sculptures, carved in the 1940s. Her Festival Commission for the Old Town Hall Pittenweem is the first manifestation of this new body of work.

Positive Patterns is an installation of 3-D prototype prints of the concealed, interior spaces of the original sculptures. This series of pierced oval forms is often described with reference to the land and seascapes of Hepworth's home on the Cornish coast but Borland's works make tangible the concealed shapes and negative space held within Hepworth's sculptures and allude to more complex sub-conscious themes.




Recent exhibitions include Circles of Focus Centre for Contemporary Art Glasgow with Brody Condon (2015); Cast From Nature Glasgow Sculpture Studios Glasgow (2010) and Camden Arts Centre London (2011); SimBodies and NoBodies Ormeau Baths Gallery Belfast and Galeria Toni Tapies Barcelona (all 2010); With Practise Newlyn Art Gallery Penzance (2007). To be Set and Sown in the Garden is a permanent sculpture commission in the grounds of Glasgow University (2001). Christine was shortlisted for the Turner Prize in 1997. She is a Professor of Fine Art at Northumbria University Newcastle upon Tyne.








Invited Artists

Born in Fife, Nerine Tassie graduated from Edinburgh College of Art in 2002 with a degree in Fine Art. Natural spaces and forms provide the basis and inspiration for her work, in particular the coastal waters and woodlands around her home. These landscapes are ever-changing and at times daunting and they provide infinite subject matter for her work. Her paintings are primarily an exploration of the mystery of nature within this subject matter and she says she has always sought to create a strong sense of atmosphere and connection to place within her work.

In 2015 Nerine was awarded Sky Arts Landscape Artist of the Year.



enjoy the act of painting and the physicality of the paintwork on the canvas and so my process of working involves experimenting with base layers of varied materials in order to constantly develop new experiences within each painting.


By exploring a range of materials I try to create as rich a texture to the work as I can which means that each painting takes on its own developing surface and object quality.

I use a variety of techniques within my work but most recently I have been exploring the relationship between composition and frame within each painting, experimenting with this balance in order to create more depth of focus for the viewer.



I am a graduate of Edinburgh College of Art and a current member of the Society of Scottish Artists (SSA) and Visual Arts Scotland (VAS) and have regularly been selected to exhibit with them. I also exhibit regularly in various art galleries and group exhibitions in Edinburgh and throughout Scotland.





y work is very much influenced by the years spent growing up in Crail, with harbours, water and coastal landscapes as frequent fluences and subjects.

ecent work has seen a slight departure om earlier paintings, which were often full layers and textures, and breaks down the ings I view into distinct shapes and colours, y interpretation of landscape typically inphasises an object or a particular line I we sketched, photographed or remembered. In this way common perceptions of traditional landscape paintings are distorted and transformed by breaking features within them into a simple shape or a block of flat or textured colour. A wave or a cloud may be deconstructed and represented by a single line, or a tree to a modified shape.

Doing this often leads to a stronger focus on composition to allow clearly defined objects more emphasis in the space they occupy within the painting.

New images created especially for the Arts Festival concentrate on the coastal landscapes of Fife and I have been led by my own memories of the villages and new interpretations I have discovered as an adult revisiting some of the places I used to be so familiar with. This has led to work which tries to depict distinct contrasts and differences in the way memory allows us to view our past from our present.

Drawing on techniques of agit-prop and Soviet montage and culminating in triumphant images of protest, the groups' first production, Let Glasgow Flourish, nevertheless reveals the filmmakers' sensitivity towards individual human stories. They followed this fifteen-minute film with an altogether more ambitious project.

The script for Lost Treasure grappled with the subject of rural depopulation. Deploying Gaelic and Scots folk song, it told the history of the Highlands & Islands through the depiction of a burgeoning romance between a crofter and a young Glaswegian on a camping holiday. Members of the group researched the script over a two-week trip in July 1955 and raised finances through bake sales and lectures over the following winter. They returned the following July, during the Glasgow Fair fortnight, and shot fortminutes of footage - perhaps a third of the footage specified in the shooting script. The crofter was played by Bill MacGregowhilst the female role was taken by Anne Wright Orr, a member of the amateur Charing Cross Players.

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


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ART @ 47


