

# Crossing Day's Ledge



built my first boat when I was ten and since then boats and water have been important to me. My partner, the artist Lesley Kerman and I raced trapeze boats for fifteen years and then sailed the Devon and Cornwall coast in our gaff rigged Cornish Crabber *Jouissance*.

Dur shallow draft and our cabin heater made it possible or us to reach the secret places and the paradise creeks hat bigger boats couldn't access: Frogmore Creek, Ruan Ireek, Bow Creek, Polwheveral Creek, all provided us vith the solitude that we needed to make art.

The sailing boat in my work first appeared as an involintary image, an image that Herbert Read called eidetic, visual image that precedes conscious thought. I began cratching my own boat on pieces of wood as we voyaged ound the coast. By using found material I was able to elease a different kind of space in my work and unlock he realization that: The found is more powerful than the made



addition of the etched boat would teriously reveal the coastlines, ther conditions, harbours and erwater hazards of our actual voyagexperience. Sometimes a piece of d would reveal the image of the e where it had been found.

s shocked at how small the boat me, but the poet Tom Clark pointed that its position in space was signifiand critical.

aid that the boat, which is beyond ng distance, defined a boundary in an relationships. The boat can be as either sailing away from commution or sailing towards it.

# SEE SAW SEA



s far back as I can remember I have been conscious of the sea...It has always been there when I needed it: providing a boundless oasis for meditation and inspiration, it nourishes the soul and eyes... Most of all I dream about the mystery and mythologies of the sea and wonder about its unexplored depths ...



The work shown here references the sea, drawn largely from memory, shown in a variety of forms and techniques. Issues of conservation feature in some of the works:

More Sea, Less Land, Mermaid and the trio of baskets Tide Lines, Gift From The Sea and A White Bird

There are concerns about migration too, as in Winged Migration (Destination Unknown) and More Migratory Thoughts.

Passes.

The three large tapestries all have their own stories: Quotation was inspired by a line in The Idiot by Dostoyevsky; Cailleach is about the Sea Hag and in Raz de Sein I remembered a very bouncy crossing from Audierne to the Ile de Sein on the Brittany coast.

Thread and fibre, seductive in their qualities; one's sense of touch, excited at the feel of some new fibre, creates a yearning to explore and create.

More recently, an interest in the process of indigo as a dye colour, explains the preponderance of this lovely blue in the recent work.

Hard-won were the crafts skills of weaving, basketry, papermaking and all the other craft disciplines I have embraced out of necessity over the years: I almost feel enabled to adopt the title: mixed-media-textile-artist,




he works I am exhibiting span two main themes: Japan and Scotland. However, the main theme is really Mokuhanga: a lovely intriguing word to describe what I do. Moku means wood in Japanese and Hanga is print.

I studied painting at Edinburgh College of Art in the eighties and a completely new change in my work happened when I went to Japan in 1996 to research and do a Masters in Japanese woodcut printing at Tama Art University Tokyo. Returning to Edinburgh in 2000 I was so taken by this way of working that it has remained the mai focus of my attention ever since.

Mokuhanga is a traditional Japanese woodblock printmaking technique, using watercolour, gouache or pure pigment applied by brush to cut wooden blocks. After the inking, the printing is done by hand, without a press, using a baren, a hand disk usually wrapped in a bamboo leaf, onto Japanese hand made paper.

This ancient printing form has a history of more than 700 years. It's the same technique used to produce the wonderfiprints on view currently at the British Museum's exhibition of Hokusai from the 1800s: Beyond the Great Wave.






works span a period of time that illustrate my sing interest in the aesthetic of Japan, a country I try -visit every two or three years. I can be inspired by irchitecture there or the wonderful gardens.

ything is explored further and it becomes then a io-based practice of releasing the inherent beauty of printmaking medium.

s clockwise from facing page: i Rain; Black Rain; Calm Sea The other more recent influence, which features in some of the works, was a residency on the wonderful island of Lewis where I spent a month in the southwest corner of this island, exploring by bicycle and on foot, taking photographs and drawing directly in the landscape.

This was further distilled back in the studio through the woodcuts, which are directly influenced by the Lewis landscape and seascape. These were further abstracted while still referencing the memory of being there.

The inspiration for this collection comes from exploring Pittenweem and the surrounding area, but also going as far afield as Pitlochry and the Cairngorm Mountains.

I always paint on good quality fabric instead of canvas or linen. I find that the story of the fabric weaves its way into the story of the painting, in particular during this project, when my blank canvas becomes the unique design and rich heritage of th Liberty brand.

My paintings are as much about process as they are about subject. Painted in high-pigment layers on coloured and patterned fabric, my work features scenes from ordinary life, painted in a style that references art history, whilst at the same time being my own.

Bold form, intense colour and heavy lines are the language through which I describe local landscapes, but also the people and objects I encounter.

As well as working on fabric, I make my own paint using the traditional technique of grinding pigment into oil.

I have been painting on fabric for over ten years, most recently producing a series of paintings on waxed cotton as part of a residency with Halley Stevenson, who manufacture waxed cotton from their factory in Dundee.

Painting the factory workers on the same fabric they helped create, influences the story of the work, particularly when Halley Stevenson's clients include staple British companies such as Barbour.

These stories and relationships act as a starting point for my paintings, which, above all, aim to capture the magic and surrealism of everyday life.

Nicola received her BA at University of Westminster London 2009 and her MFA at Duncan of Jordanstone College of Art and Design Dundee 2015.

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
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


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## ART @ 47




