he Wemyss School of Needlework was founded by Dora Wemyss, daughter of James Hay Erskine Wemyss of Wemyss, in 18⁷⁷. The school is based in the village of Coaltow of Wemyss in Fife which as its name suggests was predominantly a coal mining area. Agriculture was the other employment on the Wemyss estate so there was very little p work for girls and women. There was no transport network, apart from horse and ca and the Wemyss coal trains to Methil.

Dora was inspired by the opening of The Royal School of Need work and realised that using a slightly different model she could educate girls and women and give them a skill to earn their own money. Dora had already set up an orphanage and primary school so the Needlework School was an extension of that. She employed a local widow, Jean Webster, to become the first

Mistress who attended the Royal School to learn how teaching needlework skills was done.

The girls were trained in quilting, smocking, crewelwork, embroidery and needlepoint. All these techniques were copied from examples brought into the school by the Wemyss fain. How better to learn than to see a beautiful piece of 17th century crewelwork? As the girls learned, so the collection grew, where is why the school now has an enormothistorical collection.

Vs various mistresses came and wer the school's reputation grew. Ladv Victoria Wennyss became family Guardian in 1918. The school was ve progressive in its treatment of women workers. If the got married, they still had a job and even when children arrived, they came back as part timers, not whok timers. With the Second World War, the numbers dwindled as there was more work and better transfinks available. Up until then 36 guls were employeither at the school or working from home.



rom her studio in the garden that she has created, with a pond on eith side, Helen Kemp's ceramic creations develop with the changes of the seasons. In spring and summer, the garden is a wildlife haven, and the insects, birds and mammals found there inspire work rooted in the natural world.

As a student of ceramics, she was inspired by slip-cast Staffordshire figures, and studied this technique at post-graduate level in Glasgow. That influence is still evident, but now all pieces are hand-modelled, sometimes in series, but each unique. Further inspiration comes from Mexican ceramics and trees of life, with their mermaids, angels and exotic plants.

Winter for Helen is generally a time for dra and developing new ideas, exploring other forms, painting objects and furniture, some times used to display her ceramics.





Informed by immersion in the elements, through swimming, walking and gardening, her pieces playfully illustrate human interaction with nature, and the necessity of caring for our environment. Some do this using mythical forms, like mermaids and the half-bird, half-person harpie.

y paintings start by walking, slowing down to encounter the nuances of the landscape and gathering a spectrum of site-specifi colours affected by light, weather and time.

This has developed a sustainability and care-focused practice centred on mate form and a real drive to capture the total experience and tangibility of landscal stitch together remnant materials and gather earth and stone from the land-

scapes I draw to create pigments. By using these colour palettes rooted in place, I'm highlighting of overlooked aspects of the landscape to translate a more sustained experience.

The paintings elevate colour: a speck of heather becomes a bulbous form of unusual purple, the pa gray-green of dry lichen moves across the composition or the deep blues of arctic-alpine flora beco heavy, grounding the painting.



My practice combines personal experience with compositional and sustainable devices, such as sewing remnant materials, to create non-traditional landscape paintings.

The full window above was considered by Wilson to be one of the finest he had done.

Two of the windows are war memorials to those who died in the World Wars; these were a bequest from Miss Bowman. A third window was installed by the family of David Black and a fourth in memory of John Peat.

Joyce Laing OBE

adly, Joyce Laing OBE, died on July 17 2022. She was one of the founders in 1981 of the Pittenweem Arts Festival and was a director on the Festival Board till she stood down in 2007.

Joyce's work as an art therapist, particularly at the special unit in Barlinnie and her espousal of the recognition of Art Extraordinary are acknowledged and well-documented elsewhere.

Her contribution to conceiving the Festival and her continuing commitment to its aims were instrumental to the Festival's continuity and success. The piece below is a brief edited account that she wrote of the Festival's beginnings, taking us from 1981, its first year, up to 1985.

In 1981 an exhibition of old photographs of Pittenweem entitled Pittenweem Yesterday was presented in aid of Lifeboat funds. The response locally was overwhelming and three artists then living in Pittenweem planned to establish a Pittenweem Arts Festival the following year. It aimed to show high-quality exhibitions of visual arts and include evening performances of drama, music and poetry.

In July of 1982 the first Royal Burgh of Pittenweem Arts Festival took place. Invited artists of note exhibited in a few public venues while residents were encouraged to open a room in their house to display artists' work. A number of workshops and demonstrations of tapestry weaving, pottery and dance were also included.

DIAMONDSTUDDEDFISHNET

Our first invited artist was Ian Hamilton Finlay with his exhibition Diamond-Studded Fishnet based on fishing boats and boat names. He entitled our first Festival, A Pittenweem Fancy, using fancy in its old meaning of a celebration. The positive reports encouraged us to make the Festival an annual event.

In 1983 The Ring-Net by Will Maclean was shown in the Scout Hall, looked after by some of the older fishermen who also demonstrated net-making.

In 1984 with Dr Hew Lorimer, our then patron, the Pittenweem fishermen invited us to join the annual fishing Gala event. The Gala was a memorable happening with all the fishing fleet decorated in bunting. Each boat carried a fisher lassie, often the skipper's daughter. The boats took visitors and disabled children in convoy around the May Island.

A one-man play about the arrival of St Fillan, specially written for the Festival by Tom McGrath, was performed in St Fillan's Cave. St Fillan arrived by small fishing boat and, dressed as a monk, clambered up the ladder, accompanied by a small boy playing a fiddle.

In the Granary that year of 1985, an exhibition of photographs by Oscar Marzaroli was shown. The Smoke Box by Keith McIntyre, illuminated only by the light of smoking fish, was made into an installation.

Press articles were more numerous now and in 1982 the Scotsman had a colour section on the Festival.

Artists who have shown at the Festival include: Keith Brockie; Dorothy Stirling; Richard Demarco; Robert Callender; Elizabeth Ogilvie; Joan Eardley; Lil Neilson; Jurek Putter; John Bellany.

Visiting poets include:

Norman MacCaig; Ian Crichton Smith; George Bruce and then Poet Laureate Edwin Morgan.


