

### Return of the Bursary Award winners







ittenweem 2018 marks the first showing of a significantly new body of ceramics. Four years in development, this represents an important new phase of my making process and a radical departure from previous work.

There are two concurrent themes running through the exhibition that reference the elemental and transformative nature of light and fire. Both are interactive parts of the work itself and are outwith the control of the maker. They may leave a permanent mark on the material or pass as an unchecked moment in time.



The light series is predominantly wall mounted or site specific ceramic installations.


The Old Men's Club with its harbour-side windows houses a light-channelling work located in the window cavity that will be in a constantly shifting state with the changing light of the day. The contrasting transparency and opacity of the porcelain clay illuminates shadow and reflects light from the interior and exterior spaces. The nature of light is expansive and illusive; to harness this as an inherent component of the artwork is both stimulating and challenging.

The second strand of work captures a brief moment in time and fixes it permanently on the ceramic object.

A collection of smoke fired vessels documents in its surface, the combustible materials within the outdoor pit-firing process. The unique combination of beach-sourced firing ingredients imprints a permanent memory as they are absorbed into the porous clay in the heat of the fire before disintegrating into ash.

Both collections of work are about the passing of time, the control of it or, the freedom to let it flow unchecked.

# Migrations

A project that is thoughtful, sensitive and compassionate... A field study of adversity... A nature expedition through dystopia





am privileged to spend my days in wild and beautiful places painting birds. I am fascinated by them; by their abstract shape their song, their behaviour, thei migrations. I have sketched them, and helped in scientific studies of their migra-

tory journeys from the Arctic right down into Africa.

Three years ago I watched as The Summer of Boats unfolded into a refugee crisis and saw newscasters reporting from beaches c Mediterranean islands as desperate peopl came ashore. I recognised these islands as the same places I had travelled to watch and sketch migratory birds and now here were people in a similar state of immedia survival, taking the same lines of flight as the birds I portray.

Through the course of a year, I travelled through the UK and Europe, through the Mediterranean to the Middle East. On my travels I spoke to refugees, to locals and to volunteers and I sketched what I saw: the people, the places and the birds.

One of the interests that ecologists have in birds is that they are important environmental indicators. If the populations or migration of the birds change, this points to change in the environment that could b of grave concern. The issues are complex, but academic studies draw a link between climate change, conflict and refugee crises that cause further social and environmental stress.

In these complex systems, ecologists look t the birds to indicate what might be happe ing to our world. They are telling us something we can now recognise for ourselves, and how we address the intertwined issue of climate change and refugee crises will define who we are and what societies we live in for generations to come.

I documented what I saw on my travels and expressed these interwoven topics through a series of paintings back in the studio, but often the stories I heard and the things I saw were difficult to express and too hard to portray. I often concentrated my attention on the details and the surface texture – the ephemera of the boats and camps and studies of the birds that I found there.

The project challenged me artistically and personally and I often found myself very far outside my comfort zone.

I taught art classes in refugee schools and organised art activities for unaccompanied children in some of the camps. I was mugged in Sicily, caught in a riot in Calais and escorted off sites by armed police and soldiers, but my experiences were matched by the inspirational humanity of the many refugees and volunteers that I met.

he shapes, lines and composition of Sophia's work stem from environments that are closely associated with water, especially swimming pools, lakes and the sea.

Her work was inspired initially by her dedication to and love of swimming and water sports: competitively for thirteen years and more recently for fitness and enjoyment.



A bright colour palette accentuates the climactic perspective, the light and shadows of different environments. Examples are the extraordinary backdrop of Kantrida Swimming Pools in Rijeka and the colours and architecture of coastal Durban.

She looks in particular at the architecture surrounding these watery spaces, as well as the imagery created from the moving water and reflections.

Currently, Sophia is focussing on the beauty of the natural and urban environment on her doorstep, creating work that enhances a specific place and space. The conversation between different media and imagery within her drawing and making has initiated a more three dimensional approach.

She still wants the simplicity and beauty of the paint to be recognised and has paid particular attention to the quality and precision of the painted surface. This has enabled her to create complex three dimensional work with a dramatic resonating impact on the viewer.



It is unfortunate that there are some people who take advantage of the artists who have paid the registration fee. It is the fee that enables the continuing success of our unique event.




# Scott Morris/ photographer and artist
